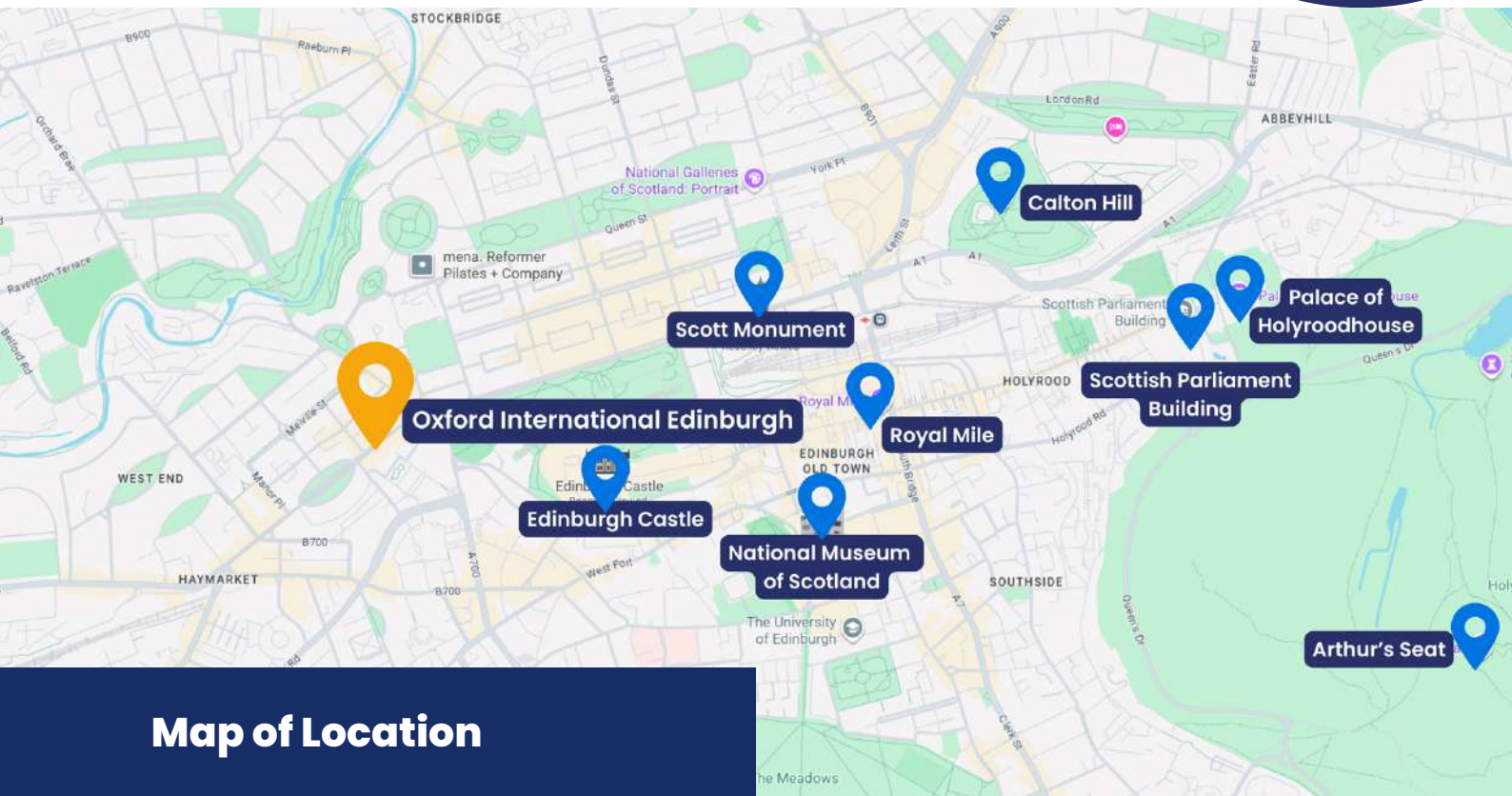

Accommodation

Homestay

- Please keep your keys safe at all times and avoid putting the address of your homestay on them. If they are lost, then no one will know where the keys belong, which is much safer. You will be expected to pay for the loss of your keys, so please keep them safe at all times.
- As you are living in a private home, it is always respectful and polite to not invite guests back without your host's permission first. Permission to do so is at your host's discretion. Overnight guests are not permitted.

Homestay accommodation is carefully selected and inspected by Hosts International, an accommodation provider that works with Oxford International.

Your homestay should be clean, tidy, and welcoming for you at all times, and your hosts will treat you as a friend or as part of their family. It is common that you will travel to school by public transport, which can take on average 45–60 minutes. If you have any reason to wish to move from your allocated homestay, you can discuss this with the Student Services Team at the school. A certain notice period is required. Please refer to the terms and conditions which can be found on the website or at the school reception.

Finding Private Accommodation

If you are thinking about renting private accommodation, there are many different things to consider:

- Always visit the accommodation with a friend – do not go alone.
- Never pay any money in advance of signing a contract with your landlord.
- Remember to read your contract thoroughly before signing it and paying a deposit – it may be for a specific time period or include some hidden costs.
- If you would like someone from the school to double-check your contract, you can ask at reception.
- As well as your rent, there may be extra costs to consider. For example: council tax, TV license, and other bills.
- Meet your flatmates before you sign a contract if you can – this could make the difference between a good or bad stay!

According to the British Council, the estimated living cost in the UK is between £900 to £1,500 per month, including rent.*

*Living costs are an average across the UK, and can vary from city to city.

Your First Day at Oxford International

 Your course will always start on a Monday (unless it's a Bank Holiday). On your first morning, please arrive at 08:45 am local time.

 When you arrive, we'll ask you to fill in a short registration form and complete a placement test, so we can make sure you're in the class that's right for your level.

 Afterwards, you'll join our induction, where you'll get to know the school, how everything works, and meet some of the key people who will support you during your time here – including our Principal, Director of Studies, and the friendly Student Services team.

 Next, we'll take you on a walking tour of Edinburgh. This is a great chance to explore the city, find your way around, and pick up a bus pass if you need one. After the tour, you'll have some free time for lunch before classes begin.

- If you're on an **Afternoon** course, your first lessons will be that afternoon.
- If you're on a **Morning** course, you'll start your classes on Tuesday.

Travel To & From School

Getting to School by Bus

When you arrive, your Homestay hosts should show you where to get on and off the bus to travel to school. If you feel unsure about how to get back home on your first day, please ask reception for help.

Bus Travel in Edinburgh

Edinburgh has a great public transport system with Lothian Buses and the tram. Buses are frequent and also offer Night Buses throughout the week. Students will be shown how to get a bus card on their first day, and they will also have the option to use contactless payment. If you are travelling every day on the bus, purchasing a bus pass is the cheapest and most flexible option. Students are encouraged (and shown how on their first day) to download the Lothian Bus Company App, which is the best way to purchase a ticket. Staff will also show students where they can purchase a physical card on their first day tour, if necessary.



Travel by Taxi

Taking taxis is a fast way to get around the city but you should call and book a taxi ahead of time if you can. Black cabs (hackney carriages) can be stopped on the road, but they will cost more than taxi companies that can be booked by phone.



Cycling

Cycling is getting better and better, and the city has an increasing network of secure cycle paths. Edinburgh is hilly and windy, so as long as you know this and are prepared, you will be fine! You can buy or hire bicycles at one of the many bicycle shops nearby. Please remember to also purchase your cycle helmet and lights as well. There are a limited number of bike racks at the corner outside Charlotte Chapel. There's also a new e-bike scheme between Voi and Edinburgh Council. Hire from anywhere in town and pay per minute/hour.

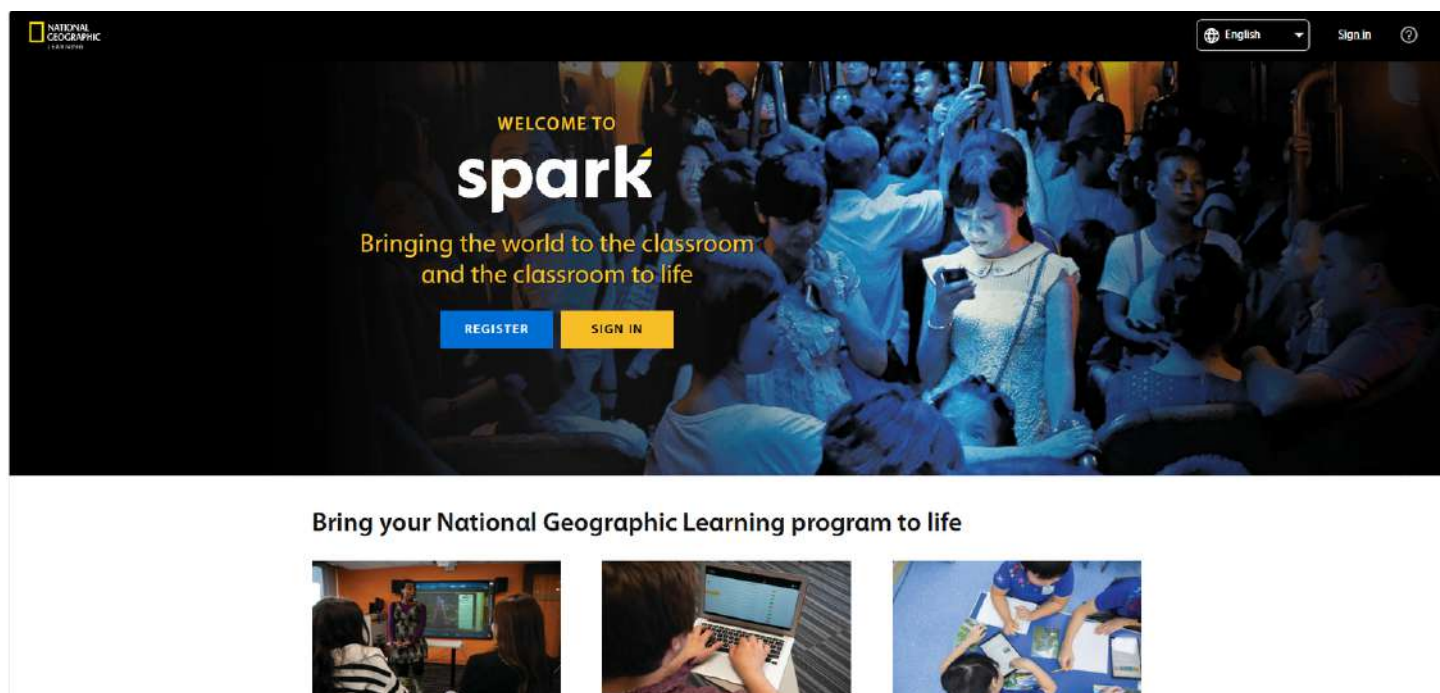

Improving English Skills

Your teachers will help you improve your English, but the fastest progress happens when you take responsibility for your own learning.

 **Be proactive** – don't wait for the language to come to you, go and look for it.

 **Take part in social programme events** – practise English while exploring new activities and making friends.

 **Join a club or activity you enjoy** – whether it's sport, music, volunteering, or a hobby, it's a great way to meet people and use English in real-life situations.

 **Use Student Support Services** – the Student Support Officer can give extra help (see info boards for details).

Some ideas for practising outside the classroom are below:

How Can I Improve My Listening?

 Watch TV shows or films you enjoy – try Netflix with English subtitles.

 Use apps like Spotify or Apple Podcasts to follow news, music, or debates.

 Act it out! Use YouTube clips or TikToks – copy the dialogue and practise with a friend.

 Use speech shadowing apps (e.g., ELSA Speak, Speechling) to copy pronunciation, stress, and intonation.

 Don't worry about every word – focus on the main idea.

How Can I Improve My Reading?

 Read short English articles online – BBC News, The Guardian, or News in Levels.

 Time yourself with a reading speed app (Spreeder, ReadLang).

 Follow English news on Instagram or Twitter/X and guess the vocabulary before reading comments.

 Listen to a podcast or news story, then compare it to the written version.

 Compare two reports online – or a news article + TikTok summary – note new info.

 Download a news or reading app (BBC, Flipboard, Medium).

How Can I Improve My Writing?

- 📅 Keep a diary in English – or start a blog or Instagram caption challenge.
- 📝 Collect model texts – or use Quillbot / Grammarly to analyse writing styles.
- 📖 Use a learner's dictionary app (Cambridge, Oxford, Longman).
- 🎬 Leave a review on Google, TripAdvisor, or Letterboxd in English – then edit and improve it.
- 💻 Use online platforms like Lang-8 or Reddit's r/EnglishLearning to share your writing and get feedback.

How Can I Improve My Speaking?

- ✅ Make mistakes! That's how you learn.
- 🎵 Sing along with Spotify lyrics or YouTube karaoke.
- 🎤 Use voice recording apps or even WhatsApp voice notes to practise.
- 👥 Video chat with friends in English (Zoom, Teams, WhatsApp, Discord).
- 💬 Use AI speaking partners or language apps (e.g., HelloTalk, Tandem, Duolingo Speaking).
- 🚫 Avoid your first language with friends – set up an “English-only challenge” for a day.
- 🪑 Join meet-ups or online clubs to practise with new people.

How Can I Improve My Grammar?

- 👉 Pick a grammar point – then search for a YouTube explainer or TikTok teacher on it.
- 😬 Test yourself with Quizlet flashcards or Kahoot quizzes.
- 📖 Use free grammar tools (Perfect English Grammar, Grammarly explanations).
- 📝 Keep a “grammar goals” list in Notion, Google Keep, or Trello – tick off as you master each one.



How Can I Improve My Vocabulary?

- 📖 Keep a notebook – or use Quizlet/Anki flashcards on your phone.
- 🔖 Save words on LingQ or ReadLang while reading online.
- 👉 Post a daily “new word sentence” on Instagram, TikTok, or Twitter/X.
- 🔄 Collect collocations with tools like SkELL or YouGlish.
- 🔊 Use online dictionaries with audio pronunciation.
- 🕒 Review words with spaced repetition apps like Anki or Memrise.

 Each week's activities are displayed at Reception, but if you have any questions – or want to sign up – just ask our Student Services team.

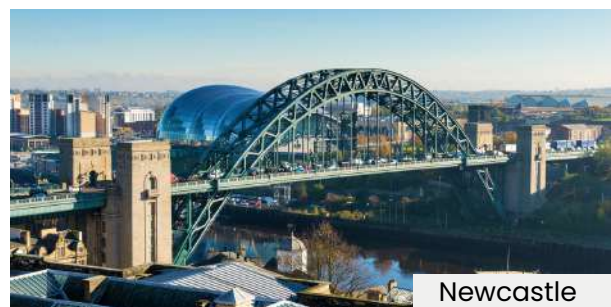

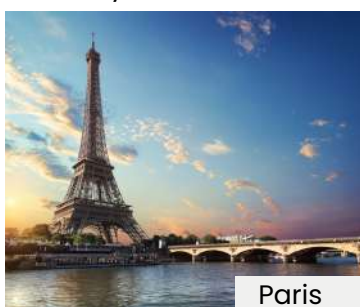

Anti-Discrimination & Bullying Policy

At Oxford International, we do not tolerate bullying or discrimination. Everyone should be treated with respect.

Bullying Can Be:

 **Physical:** hitting, pushing, tripping, stealing, pulling hair, or damaging someone's belongings.

 **Verbal:** sexual comments, threats, name-calling, teasing, or offensive remarks about someone's race, religion, gender, or political beliefs.

 **Social:** ignoring someone, spreading rumours, excluding them from groups, or telling others not to be friends with them.

 **Cyber:** sending nasty texts or emails, posting rude comments on social media, sharing inappropriate photos, or making prank calls.

Anti-Discrimination Policy

At Oxford International, we have a zero-tolerance policy towards racism, bullying, and discrimination. Everyone in our school community – staff and students – must treat each other with equal respect, no matter their colour, culture, beliefs, gender, sexual orientation, or background.

What to Do if You Experience Bullying or Harassment

 Don't pretend to be friends with a bully or racist.

 A Parental Consent form must be provided before arrival.

 If you miss class and we can't reach you, we will contact your homestay and parents.

Curfew Times

If you are 16–17 years old, you must be back at your homestay by 10:00pm.

If You Have a Problem

Big or small, at school or in your accommodation, please talk to us.

 The Principal is the Designated Lead for under-18 Welfare & Safeguarding.

 You can also talk to any staff member, or ask your family to contact us if that feels easier.

 The most important thing is: **don't keep problems to yourself.**

 If you are sick, you must call the school before 9:00am to let us know.

After Class

 You are welcome to stay at school until 17:30 to study, use the school laptops, socialise, or relax.

Social Programme

You are welcome to join most social activities.

 Staff will make sure you feel safe during events.

 If you are under 18, you cannot join pub or nightclub activities. These will always be clearly marked as 18+ only on the Social Programme calendar.

Attendance Rules & UKVI

Rules and Regulations – Attendance

At Oxford International, we expect all students to attend 100% of their classes. To successfully complete your course and receive your certificate of completion, you must attend at least 80% of your classes.

Attendance is not only important for your progress, but also a legal requirement for many students on visas. If your attendance falls below 80%, you may not receive your certificate, and it could affect your visa or sponsorship.

Authorised Absences

Sometimes, you may need to miss class. An absence is only authorised if:

 You ask Student Services for permission at least 2 weeks before a holiday or planned absence.

Unauthorised Absences

If you miss class without permission, it will be marked as an unauthorised absence.

- This will lower your attendance percentage.
- Regular unauthorised absences may result in a formal warning.
- Continued unauthorised absences could mean you are asked to leave the school with no refund.

Consequences of Low Attendance

- Any student with less than 80% attendance will not receive an end-of-course certificate.
- The UKVI (UK Visa and Immigration) will be informed if your attendance is too low (for visa students).
- This may cause problems with visa extensions or renewals in the future.

Attendance Process for Visa & Sponsored Students

UKVI requires all students in language schools, colleges, and universities to attend classes with a minimum of 80% attendance. If your attendance falls, the following process applies:

1. **Friendly reminder** – we'll speak to you if your attendance starts dropping.
2. **Verbal warning** – added to your record.
3. **First written warning** – meeting with the Principal, recorded on file.
4. **Second written warning** – another meeting, your agent/parents notified, and you are put on your final warning.
5. **Attendance Agreement** – signed document setting conditions for improvement.
6. **Expulsion** – if you still fail to attend without permission, you will be removed from the school, no refund given, and UKVI informed.

If your attendance starts to fall close to 80%:	We will have a friendly word with you to make sure your attendance does not keep dropping.
If your attendance falls below 80% (without permission):	You will be given a verbal warning. This will be kept on your record.
If your attendance is below 80% and has continued to drop since your verbal warning OR you miss 3 days in a row (without permission):	You will be issued a 1st Written Warning and you will be given an appointment to go and see the School Principal to explain your unauthorised absence. This will be added to your record.
If your attendance is below 80% since your 1st written warning and it has continued to drop OR you miss a further 3 days in a row (without permission):	You will be issued with a 2nd Written Warning and you will be given an appointment to go and see the School Principal to explain your continued unauthorised absence. This will be added to your record and your agent/parent notified you are on your final warning. This is your last chance to improve.
FINAL WARNING. If your attendance is below 80% since your 2nd written warning and it has continued to drop OR you have missed 10 days in a row (without permission):	You will be issued an Attendance Agreement by the School Principal. This will explain the terms and conditions of your course and the attendance policy. If you continue to fail to come to school without permission you will be expelled from the school without refund.
Expulsion:	You will be asked to leave the school and we will inform the UKVI and your parent and/or agent. If you are on a Tier 4 visa, you will be asked to leave the country immediately.

Expectations in Class

Punctuality & Lateness Policy

Being on time is a key part of your learning. Arriving late disrupts the class, makes it harder for you to follow the lesson, and affects your classmates' learning. That's why we expect all students to arrive on time for every class.

What Happens if You're Late

- **0–5 minutes late** → Go directly to class. Please enter quietly and without disturbing others.
- **5–15 minutes late** → Report to Reception first. You will need to explain why you are late and collect a late slip before joining your class.
- **Over 15 minutes late** → You cannot enter the class until after the next break. You may wait in the student common area until the lesson resumes.

Repeated Lateness

We understand that sometimes things happen — traffic, buses, or unexpected delays. If this happens occasionally, you will still be allowed into class. However:

- If you are late more than **twice in one week**, you may not be given a late slip and will need to wait until the next lesson.
- Frequent lateness will be recorded and may lead to a meeting with the Principal.
- **No refunds** will be given for lessons missed because of lateness.

If you know that you may often arrive late (for example due to long travel distance), please speak to the **Principal** so we can discuss alternative arrangements.

Code of Conduct in Class

Our classrooms are designed to be positive, supportive spaces for learning. To help everyone enjoy their lessons and make progress, we ask all students to follow these rules:

-  Keep your phone on silent during class.
-  No food or drink in class (water only).
-  Try to speak English at all times – it's the fastest way to improve.
-  Listen respectfully to your teacher and classmates.
-  Actively participate in activities and discussions.
-  Show a positive attitude and willingness to learn.



Complaints and Problems

At Oxford International, we want all students and staff to feel happy, safe, and respected. Everyone has the right to study and work in a positive environment.

Respect and Behaviour

- All staff and students must act politely and respectfully at all times.
- The school will not accept rude, abusive, or disrespectful behaviour.
 - Staff who act in this way will be dealt with by the Principal.
 - Students who act in this way may be cautioned or asked to leave the school without a refund.
- By enrolling at the school, you accept this policy as part of our school rules.

Complaints Procedure

- If you wish to make a formal complaint, you must do so within one month of the event with the School Principal.
- Please ask at Reception for a copy of the full Student Complaints Policy.

Health & Safety

Your safety is very important to us. Please take a moment to familiarise yourself with the following:

First Aid

- If you need first aid, go straight to Reception or ask your teacher who is the nearest first aider.
- Signs around the school show who the trained First Aiders are.

Hazards

- A hazard means anything that could cause harm (for example, water spilled on the floor).
- If you see a hazard, please tell Reception immediately so it can be made safe.
- Please also notify reception if you have spilled anything yourself, so it can be cleaned up immediately.

Accidents

- If you or another student have an accident, report it to Reception straight away.
- We will make sure you get the help you need.

Fire Safety

- The fire alarm is a continuous sound. If you hear it:
 - Leave the building immediately by the nearest exit.
 - Do not stop to collect your belongings.
 - Follow the Green Exit signs around the school.

 Fire exit maps are displayed in every classroom.

 At Edinburgh, the fire meeting point is **Charlotte's Chapel**, where your teacher or a designated fire warden will guide you to safety.



Living in the UK – Know the Law

Life in the UK may feel different from what you're used to. To help you stay safe and avoid problems, here are some important laws you must follow:

Alcohol

- You must be 18 or over to buy or drink alcohol.
- If you look under 25, you may be asked for ID.

Tobacco

- You must be 18 or over to buy cigarettes or tobacco.
- Always use an ashtray – dropping cigarette ends in the street can lead to a fine.

Illegal Drugs

- It is against the law to carry or use drugs of any kind.

Sexual Relationships

- It is illegal to have sex with anyone under 16.

Weapons

- You must not carry weapons (knives, guns, sprays, etc.).
- You may carry a personal safety alarm.

Theft / Shoplifting

- Taking anything you haven't paid for is theft.
- If caught, you may be arrested.

False Reports

- It is illegal to falsely report theft or damage.

Stolen Goods

- Do not buy anything that could be stolen property.

Public Transport

- You must always have a valid ticket.
- Travelling without one could lead to a fine or prosecution.

Money & Banks

In the UK, most people use debit or credit cards for everyday payments, but cash is still accepted in most places. When you arrive, it's a good idea to open a UK bank account so you can easily receive money, pay bills, and avoid international transaction fees.

Changing Money

- You can exchange money at most **banks, post offices, or bureaux de change**.
- Be aware: exchange rates and commission fees can be **different in each place**.
- Try to avoid **£50 notes** – some shops don't like accepting them.
- We recommend the **Post Office** – it usually has good rates and no commission.

Banks in the UK

- Opening hours: **Monday–Friday 09:30–17:00** and **Saturday mornings**.
- It's usually **not possible for short-stay students** to open an account.
- For long-stay students, you will normally need:
 -  A bank reference letter (from the school office).
 -  Your ID or passport.
 -  Proof of address (tenancy agreement/utility bill if you live independently).

Online Banks

It can be much easier to open an account with an online bank such as:

- Monzo
- Revolut

These often give good exchange rates and are easy to set up from your phone.

Cards

- Visa, Mastercard and most credit/debit cards are accepted in shops and restaurants across the UK.

Places of Worship

Oxford International is part of a multicultural and multi-faith community. Whatever your beliefs, there are many places of worship in and around the city.

-  Your homestay family can often guide you to the nearest place of worship for your faith.
-  You can also ask Student Services, who will be happy to help you find the right place.

Why Visit?

 Churches, mosques, temples, and other faith centres can be a welcoming space to meet new people.

 Many offer social activities, youth groups, and outings that are open to everyone, no matter your background.

 Some also run Language Exchange events, where you can practise English and make new friends.

Emergencies & Staying Safe

Emergency Calls

Dial **999** (or **112** from a mobile) if there is a **crime, fire, accident, or danger to life**.

Non-Emergency Calls

111 – Non-urgent medical advice (speak to a nurse or doctor).

101 – Non-urgent police matters (e.g. reporting a minor crime).

Medical Treatment in the UK

- If you feel unwell, ask your **homestay family** for the name of their doctor, or call **NHS 111** for advice.
- If you are in the UK for **6 months or more**, NHS hospital treatment is usually free. Bring your **passport, visa, and enrolment letter** as proof.
- Students from the **EU** should carry a **European Health Insurance Card (EHIC)** for free NHS care, or if expired a **UK Global Health Insurance Card (GHIC)**.
- If you are in the UK for **less than 6 months** and not from the EU, you will need to **pay for treatment** – your **medical insurance** should cover these costs.

A&E (Accident & Emergency)

 Do **not go to A&E** (hospital emergency department) for **minor symptoms** such as colds, headaches, or small injuries.

 You may have to **wait for hours** and you won't be seen faster than at other services.

 Instead, use:

- **111** – for urgent medical advice.
- **Pharmacies** – for common medicines and health advice.
- **Your GP (doctor)** – for ongoing health issues.

Walk-in Medical Centre

- If you haven't registered with a local doctor (GP), you can visit a walk-in centre.
- Ask Reception for the nearest location and opening times & support in signing up at your local doctors

NHS 111 – Medical Advice

- Call 111 if you want to speak to a nurse or doctor about your symptoms.
- They will tell you whether you need a pharmacy, GP, or hospital.

Medical Emergency

- Always ask for a receipt so you can claim the cost back on your travel insurance.
